Teaching Tips: Make an pocket book by folding an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" piece of bright colored paper in $\frac{1}{2}$, hamburger style. Open the fold, and with the valley side up, fold the longer side to make a 2" flap. Place glue on the edges of the flap to make a pocket when the "booklet" is opened. Cut apart the Civil War leader rectangles. Slide the rectangles in the newly created pockets. Add symbols or picture drawings to aid memory in recalling the descriptions of each. Glue the title to the cover of the pocket book. Glue "North" on one pocket, and "South" on the other pocket. Put the leader cards in the corresponding pockets.

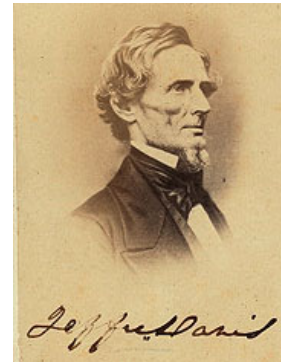

Abraham Lincoln

- President of the U.S.
- Opposed the spread of slavery
- Issued the Emancipation Proclamation
- Determined to preserve the Union even if by force
- Believed the U.S. was one nation
- Wrote the Gettysburg Address



Jefferson Davis

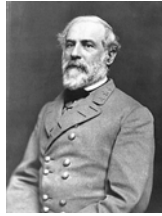
President of the Confederate States of America



Ulysses S. Grant

General of the Union army that defeated Lee

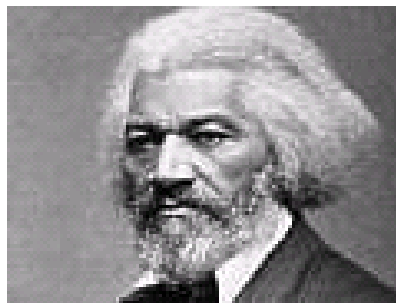
Robert E. Lee

- Leader of the Army of Northern VA
- Was offered command of the Union forces at the beginning of the war but chose not to fight against VA
- Opposed secession, but did not believe the union should be held together by force.
- Urged Southerners to accept defeat at the end of the war and reunite as Americans when some wanted to fight on



Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson

Was a skilled Confederate general from Virginia



Frederick Douglass

Was a former slave who escaped to the North and became an abolitionist
